Chief's Message

I am pleased to present the 2017 Annual Report to the citizens of Boiling Spring Lakes. It is my privilege to work alongside such a dedicated group of employees who are committed to our citizens. Our employees have continued to address the needs of the community through many challenges with determination and professionalism. This report will give the reader a glimpse into the activities and services that were provided by our agency during the past year and it will also identify goals and objectives for the upcoming year.

Significant events involving the Boiling Spring Lakes Police Department in 2017

- Population Increase from 6,296 to 6,519/ ~3.5% Increase
- > Handled 5,016 Calls for Service
- > Filed Reports on 782 incidents
- > Made 89 Arrests
- Collected over 282 pounds of unwanted medications in the Prescription Drop Box
- Successfully secured over \$24,500.00 in Grant funds from the Governor's Crime Commission (Funds have not been released by DOJ at the time of this report)
- Hosted the 28th Annual "Small Fry Fishing Tournament"
- Co-Sponsored the Halloween Trunk or Treat with BSL Parks and Recreation Department
- > Hosted the first Coffee with a Cop Community Event
- ➤ Investigated 102 Motor Vehicle Crashes ~20% Increase

Our best approach to serving our community is through collaboration with the citizens and fellow employees using the basic principles of community policing. The members of the Boiling Spring Lakes Police Department are committed to ensuring that we provide a safe community for all. We would like to thank the Mayor and City Council, the City Manager and his staff, City Department Heads, their staff and the citizens of Boiling Spring Lakes for their continued support.

Our agency, like every other law enforcement agency in the United States must be equipped to face the challenges of an uncertain society on a daily basis. The growth of our city has continued to increase over the past several years and based on the ongoing residential development throughout the city, the demands for police services will continue to increase. In order to properly meet the demands and expectations of our community, it is my responsibility as your Chief of Police to ensure that our agency is prepared to meet these challenges.

Staffing levels continue to be a priority of the agency and this past year our agency increased its staffing by adding one additional full-time sworn officer. We will continue to evaluate our agency needs in order to meet the expectations of our community.

Patrol Division

The Boiling Spring Lakes Police Department provides police coverage 365 days a year, 24 hours a day to the citizens of BSL.

In 2017, officers with the Boiling Spring Lakes Police Department responded to a total of <u>5,016</u> calls for service that were dispatched through the Brunswick County 911/Communications Center.

Internal records at the police department show that <u>3,233</u> events were logged by officers into our reporting software. These included calls for service, motor vehicle crash investigations, traffic stops, business checks, residential checks, animal control calls, and other incident reports.

Investigations

Detective Kevin Smith serves as the agency's only full-time investigator and is responsible for the majority of felony investigations, interviews of child victims, and crime scene processing.

Traffic Services

In 2017, members of the BSLPD investigated **102** motor vehicle crashes in the city limits of BSL, this was a **20%** increase from the previous year

- 484 Traffic Citations issued by officers in 2017.
- 10 Warning citations were issued during 2017.
- 20 Arrests were made for DWI.

Animal Services

During 2017, Officer John Hutt became certified through Colorado State University as an Animal Cruelty Investigator after completing 120 hours of instruction in various topics. Some of these topics of instruction include, Ethics, Animal Capture Techniques, Evidence Collection/Documentation, Livestock Investigations, Disaster Planning, Handling Exotics and Wildlife, Report Writing, and Biosecurity & Zoonosis (any disease or infection that is naturally transmissible from vertebrate animals to humans)

In addition to this certification, Officer Hutt is responsible for the maintenance of our city operated holding facility located at the public works complex. Although our hold facility is designed for temporary holding of dogs and cats, our agency is required to be inspected by the State of North Carolina on an annual basis and must meet the requirements set forth by the Department of Agriculture to remain operational. We are also subject to unannounced inspections of both our facility and animal control vehicle by the State.

Community Involvement

The Boiling Spring Lakes Police Department is dedicated to engaging with the community in numerous ways. The department supports youth programs, community watch groups, and other programs aimed at helping to improve the quality of life in our community.

Small Fry Fishing Tournament

Our agency hosted the 28th annual "Small Fry Fishing Tournament" in April of 2017. This annual event again, brought the community together to enjoy a recreational activity that is vital to our part of the state. The tournament is designed for children between the ages 3 and 12 to fish alongside local police officers.



Coffee with a Cop

In October the BSLPD partnered with The Office Coffee & Wine Bar located at 3280 George II Highway in Boiling Spring Lakes to host the first ever Coffee with a Cop in Boiling Spring Lakes. Chief Brad Shirley and other members of the agency talked with citizens about issues in BSL over a cup of coffee.



NADDI Prescription Drop Box

A permanent drop box was installed in the lobby of the Boiling Spring Lakes Police Department in August of 2014, and is available to the public Monday through Friday 8:00 AM to 4:30 PM. Residents simply bring their unwanted medications to the police department lobby, follow the instructions located on the drop box, and discard their medications.



We collected **282 lbs** of medication in 2017.

After-School Partnership with Parks and Recreation

Members of the police department join children in the afterschool program at least two days a week to assist with homework, read, or play games. The department has received positive responses from the children, staff, and other community members about our efforts at the community center. The success of this program is a result of the unwavering commitment of our officers to positively engage the youth of our community.

Our officers also participated in the annual Halloween Trunk or Treat at Spring Lake and the Fall Festival sponsored by the Special Events Committee. We look forward to continuing our working relationships with the different committees and city departments and are planning additional programs for 2017 that will impact more citizens throughout the community.

Rachel's Challenge at South Brunswick Middle School



Officer Kyle Pszczultkoski and Lieutenant Rick Spencer were invited to South Brunswick Middle School to meet with a group of students participating in "Rachel's Challenge." The challenge is for students to take a stand against bullying. Several students spoke about the effects of bullying. The group presented Lieutenant Spencer and Officer Pszczultkoski with a book full of notes written by the students thanking the police department for keeping the community safe. The students were all thankful for living in a safe community and being able to attend a safe school.
