5. Presentation ~ Pedestrian Plan ~ Mary Green, Director of Parks & Recreation Ms. Green began by thanking all those that have participated in this project. The Pedestrian Plan objective is to connect the community, to incorporate projects, policies, programs, green infrastructure, to address storm water, and an action plan to move all of this forward.

6. Public Hearing ~ Zoning Map Amendment ~ R-1, R-2 & R-5 Recreation ~ Ms. Nicole Morgan, Planning & Zoning Administrator

A *motion* was made by Commissioner Barger, a *second* by Commissioner Witt to move into the Public Hearing.

Ms. Morgan explained a request was submitted by Mary Green, Director of Parks & Recreation, to rezone several City owned properties from residential to recreation. Public parks and recreation are already permitted in the residential zoning district. Residential uses are not permitted in the recreation district. The recreation district is intended to preserve future public open space. All the properties listed on the rezoning are listed in the future Land Use map as residential. These properties would allow access to the lakes and are owned by the City. The properties are in alignment to conserve open space.

Public Hearing Comments ~

a. Michael Williams – 76 Pine Shore Dr.

Mr. Williams expressed his concerns mainly on the R-1 properties. Mr. Williams suggested selling the R-1 lots and donating the funds to Parks & Recreation to assist with new equipment, and possibly other issues such as drainage in the City.

b. Ashley Lee – 2385 Frink Lake Dr.

Ms. Lee expressed her concerns with respect to the rezoning. What is clearly stated as permissible uses are boat ramps, miniature golf courses, outdoor displays and storage are permitted; private clubs and youth centers are also permitted. Other concerns expressed were flood hazard areas; and many apprehensions by property owners with regard to recreational development and disturbance to wildlife.

c. Gene Formy Duval ~ 803 North Shore Dr.

I own two additional lots which I bought as an investment. There are additional park areas that are not being utilized, I question the addition of more parks.

a. Karen Hartigen ~ 801 South Shore Dr.

Mrs. Hartigen commented, she is the previous Garden Club Chairman. The Club has become inactive due to citizens aging out. Mrs. Hartigen strongly commented on the neglected areas of the City such as the Mitch Prince Memorial and pond and the entrance walls just to name a few. This is a poor reflection on our City which shows the neglect and being long forgotten. If Buildings and Grounds cannot provide the service then perhaps we should hire a contractor.

a. Michael Williams ~ 78 Pine Shore Dr.

Mr. Williams commented about the timing of the water released in the Big Lake prior to Hurricane Florence. The gates of the dam were not opened soon enough. I would like to know what the town is planning on doing with all the growth in the dam. All that was needed was to release the water two weeks before the storm. Unfortunately, the ledger

book that holds the information has disappeared and no one knows where it is. This is public information.

 No Planning Board Meeting was held in October
- c. Parks & Recreation Advisory Board, Barbara Bennett Snyder, Chair We held our meeting on October 21, 2020 with a full quorum. Expanded hours at the Community Center for the fitness room, after school program and senior exercise programs are all going well. The Learning Garden is now a revival of the Community Garden. Mary Green is working on a grant to get the Learning Garden started as a permanent structure. We have now elected the chair and vice-chair.
- d. Special Events, Commissioner Hall reported On November 29, 2020, the committee will meet to decorate the tree for Christmas; however, all public events have been cancelled.
- e. Library Commission, Sherri Kuzian, Chair Commissioner Witt reported the Commission did not meet in October.

f. BSL Fire / Rescue ~ Chief Theresa Tickle

In October we had 35 medical calls and we are currently responding to all calls. We had 30 related fire calls and held our annual Bar-B-Q sale and profited \$1,100.00 and appreciate the support. Christmas trees will be here on November 23 and 24 and ready for sale. On December 4th we will be driving through the City with Santa Claus, and will plan the route with Chief Jordon. We held the election of officers for a term of two years; Theresa Tickle, Chief; President, Darrell Bryant; Secretary, CeCe McConnell and District member, Joan Kinney.

11. City Manager's Monthly Report ~ Manager Jeff Repp

- o As of September 30, 2020, the City had \$1,840,094.00 in cash and investments.
- O Sales tax revenue is ahead of schedule after four (4) months we are at 16.1%. This is \$53,095 more than last year at this time.
- Property tax collections are ahead of schedule. We have collected approximately 80% to date.
- o New residential building permits so far this year are 19, We estimate 50 permits by end of the fiscal year.
- MOTSU/EBSR work will begin in January 2021. We estimate three weeks of road closure.
- New Police Department ~ we are on schedule with the design criteria and hope to issue the design to the contractors in January, 2021 to submit their bids.
- The finance position has been filled, Suzanne Tungate will be starting on November 16, 2020. The Police Department has filled the open position of administrative assistance. Kristin Walsh will be starting on November 23, 2020. A resignation was received from Officer Kyre Keen, Officer Perrone will now be filling that position leaving the open position of animal control to be filled.

Boiling Spring Lakes has several community features (see Key Community Features map) that provide important services and enrich the quality of life for its residents. These features serve as potential pedestrian origins and destinations. The Steering Committee reported current pedestrian activity at the following locations: Lake Patricia, the commercial district on George II Highway, the community center, and South Brunswick Middle and High School. By improving connectivity between these locations and Boiling Spring Lakes' neighborhoods, residents would be more likely to walk. An infrastructure project's ability to provide connectivity to these origins and destinations was one variable used to prioritize projects.

INFRASTRUCTURE

The City of Boiling Spring Lakes is located south of Leland and north of Oak Island. George II Highway (Highway 87), a two-lane highway, runs through

the center of the city intersecting with East Boiling Spring Road, Patricia Lake, Fifty Lakes Drive, and Cougar Road. The major roads in Boiling Spring Lakes, such as East Boiling Spring Road, George II Highway (Highway 87), and Cougar Road, are maintained by NCDOT. There is one private road (Bet Lane) and the City maintains the remaining residential streets (paved and unpaved).

EXISTING PEDESTRIAN FACILITIES

The City of Boiling Spring Lakes does not currently have pedestrian facilities along roadways, except for a partial sidewalk in front of City Hall along E Boiling Spring Road (see map, following). Some unpaved nature trails are available for recreational use at the Boiling Spring Lakes Community Center. Based on input from the Steering Committee, the absence of pedestrian facilities is notable and creates a dangerous environment for multimodal travel

in various locations. The schools are lacking pedestrian crossings for students walking from nearby neighborhoods. Additionally, there are many recreational and natural areas in the town that generate pedestrian activity but have no pedestrian facilities connecting to neighborhood streets.

VULNERABILITY TO STORM EVENTS

The City of Boiling Spring Lakes has already been impacted by extreme flooding and infrastructure failure after Hurricane Florence (2018), where five dams were breached. Sanford Dam was breached which caused subsequent breaches at North Lake, Pine Lake, Middle Dam, and Upper Dam (see map, following). These breaches not only caused flooding and lengthy detours during the storm but resulted in these major recreational assets to be drained. See Annual Flood Impact map, following.



EXISTING PLANS AND PROGRAMMED PROJECTS

The City of Boiling Spring Lakes has had multiple planning efforts that have contributed to preserving natural resources, recreational activities, and infrastructure development. The following documents were reviewed to understand the land use and regulatory environment in the City and the region: City of Boiling Spring Lakes Comprehensive Land Use Plan, Boiling Spring Lakes Planning Board Long Range Plan, 2018–2023 Parks, Recreation, and Open Space Master Plan for the City of Boiling Spring Lakes, Brunswick County Trail Plan, Brunswick

County Comprehensive Transportation Plan, Brunswick County CAMA Land Use Plan, Military Ocean Terminal Sunny Point (MOTSU) Joint Land Use Study (JLUS).

The preservation of recreational resources and dedication to quality of life are common themes in past planning efforts. This contributes significantly to the dedication the City of Boiling Spring Lakes has to its natural assets and promoting active transportation. See Existing Facilities map, following.

Active transportation offers many benefits including improved health, reduced environmental impacts, and fewer financial commitments from decreased dependency on the automobile. The following outlines infrastructure, policy, and program improvements that are recommended to provide the City of Boiling Spring Lakes with a safe, accessible, and connected active transportation network.

PROJECT PRIORITIZATION

Project corridors were prioritized using a methodology developed specifically for Boiling Spring Lakes. The methodology was inspired by the NCDOT Prioritization 6.0 process, which is a data-driven process for prioritizing the funding of major transportation projects in the state. This Plan's prioritization methodology was intentionally based

on Prioritization 6.0 as the pedestrian infrastructure projects proposed for the City would most likely be funded through this process. See the City of Boiling Spring Lakes Pedestrian Plan document for more detail.







PROJECTS

Recommended improvements in this plan include multiuse paths along NC 87, major thoroughfares including Fifty Lakes Drive, Alton Lennon Drive, and East Boiling Spring Road, sidewalks along Cougar Road, and crossing improvements across the community.

All proposed projects are intended to provide safe connections between origins and destinations within the City while promoting exercise and mobility. The projects were developed through collaboration with the Steering Committee, field analysis, and public input. All pedestrian facility recommendations along NCDOT maintained roadways will require coordination with NCDOT Highway Division 3 as part of implementation. The following section outlines projects in detail, according to Tier 1, Tier 2, and Tier 3. Tiers are based on project prioritization.



City Manager's Report Property Tax Collections




